Epiphany

Epiphany celebrates the light of Jesus Christ shining into the world, a light that continues to guide us long after the glow of Christmas has faded. Observed in the Western church on January 6, the name comes from the Greek *epiphaneia*, meaning “appearance” or “manifestation.” At its heart, Epiphany proclaims that God does not remain hidden or distant but chooses to be revealed—made visible—in Jesus Christ. The visit of the Magi, often called Three Kings Day, is the central story in the West: wise travelers from distant lands who recognize in the Christ Child the presence of God. Their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh symbolize Jesus’ kingship, divinity, and sacrificial love. In many Christian traditions, Christmas does not end on December 25 but continues for twelve days, culminating in Epiphany, the moment when Christ is shown to the nations.

Epiphany is one of the oldest Christian feast days, honored in both Eastern and Western churches. Western Christians celebrate Christmas on December 25 and Epiphany on January 6, focusing on the Magi’s journey. Eastern Orthodox Christians follow the Julian calendar, celebrating Christmas on January 7 and Epiphany on January 19, with a strong emphasis on Jesus’ baptism. In the East, the baptism of Christ is understood as a profound revelation of the Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—made manifest in the waters of the Jordan. Whether through the Magi, the baptism, or the first miracle at Cana, Epiphany affirms a central Christian conviction: that God’s glory is not confined to heaven but breaks into the world in ways that invite recognition, wonder, and response.

The religious philosophy of Epiphany is rooted in the belief that God’s revelation is universal. The Magi come from far beyond Israel, representing the nations of the world. Their journey suggests that God’s light reaches across cultures, languages, and borders, drawing all people toward Christ. Epiphany teaches that faith is not limited to one people or place; it is a gift meant for the whole world. It also reminds us that God often appears in unexpected ways—in a humble child, in ordinary water, in a simple wedding feast—inviting us to look for the holy in the everyday. The season of Epiphany, which continues until Ash Wednesday in many churches, encourages Christians to pay attention to the ways Christ is revealed in our own lives: in acts of compassion, in moments of clarity, in the quiet leading of the Spirit.

Around the world, Epiphany and Three Kings Day are celebrated with customs that reflect this universal reach of God’s revelation. In Puerto Rico, children prepare for the Magi by filling a small box with grass or hay for the kings’ camels and placing it under their beds, hoping to receive gifts in return. In Mexico, families gather to share *rosca de reyes*, a ring-shaped sweet bread with a tiny hidden figurine baked inside; the person who finds it is said to receive a blessing of good fortune. Across Spain, the evening before Epiphany brings grand parades called *Cabalgata de Reyes*, filled with floats, music, and candy tossed to cheering crowds. In Belgium, Poland, and Portugal, children dress as the Magi and go door-to-door singing songs and receiving treats or coins, echoing the joy and generosity of the kings’ journey.

In Greece, Epiphany centers on the Great Blessing of Waters. A priest throws a cross into the sea, and swimmers race to retrieve it as a sign of blessing and renewal. Russia observes Epiphany on January 19 with icy plunges into lakes or rivers, where worshippers dip themselves three times in remembrance of Jesus' baptism and the Holy Trinity. In Austria and Germany, families take part in the tradition of "chalking the door," writing a blessing such as 20~C~M~B~26 above their doorway. The letters recall the names of the Magi and also stand for a Latin prayer asking Christ to bless the home in the coming year. These diverse celebrations—whether joyful parades, shared meals, songs at the doorstep, or blessings over water and home—express the same theological truth: Epiphany proclaims that Christ is revealed not only to a few but to the whole world. The light that guided the Magi still shines, calling people of every culture and generation to recognize God's presence, to follow where Christ leads, and to reflect that light in their own lives.

A Prayer for the Feast of the Epiphany

*I wonder sometimes
If one of the stars that lit Abraham's night
Was the one that led the Magi to Jesus.
A dark canvas speckled by the most generous brush—
What an improbable promise to an old man.
But our God has never been daunted by the unlikely, the impossible.
What a sight for the Magi, too,
A baby resting on hay, his cries mingled with braying and bleating.
I like to think they heard in those everyday sounds a holy chorus,
Saw in that noisy tableau a Creator serenaded by His creation,
All of it embodied, enfleshed—
All of it good.
And when we've left our gifts for this implausible King,
May we, like the Magi, go home by another way—
Having encountered the holy,
May we protect it, guard it,
Trail its light behind us wherever we go.
A sacred arc transposed from heaven to earth,
May we ourselves become the star,
Leading the way to Emmanuel.*

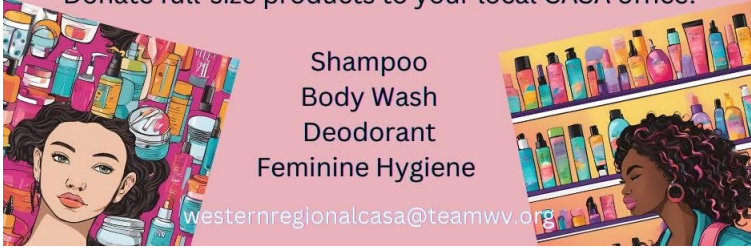

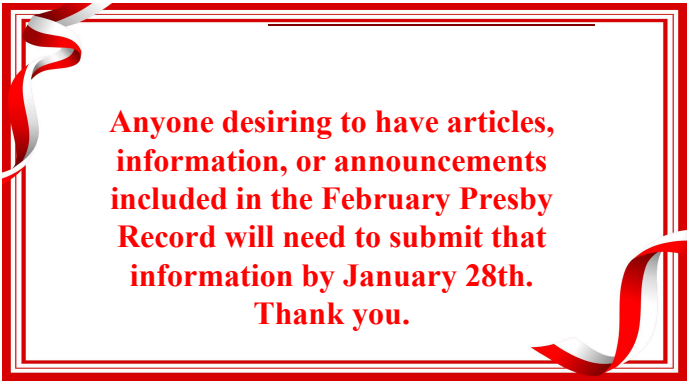


1/25 Travel Talk on Peru
